Mr. Mahar,

I am writing in response to your email of 1 October 2018 addressed to the Commission Chairman, Ian Scott.

With respect to your request for an explanation as to “why exactly CRTC file 1000-121 was destroyed on March 27th, 2006”, as previously indicated to you in my emails of 24 August 2007, 10 October 2007, 12 October 2007, 15 August 2012 and 22 August 2012, File 1000-121 was destroyed in accordance with the Commission’s Retention and Destruction Policy (the Policy). File 1000-121 was a complaint file and, pursuant to the Commission’s practices, complaint files would be kept for at least 4 years from the date of the close of record. File 1000-121 was closed on 11 July 1996. Accordingly, its destruction could have occurred any time after 11 July 2000.

With respect to your request to “identify who at the CRTC made the decision to destroy CRTC file 1000-121 at that particular time”, as also previously indicated to you, the Commission authorized the destruction of File 1000-121 in accordance with the Policy.

I consider that these questions have been fully answered in accordance with Commission practices and policies and trust that this information is helpful.

Dear Mr. Scott,

During the 2006 federal election, my lawyer Paul Armarego notified Stephen Harper and three other politicians about my allegations of corruption at the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission in relation to CRTC file 1000-121 (as attached).

Shortly after Mr. Harper became prime minister and appointed a former CRTC commission as minister of Canadian Heritage, CRTC file 1000-121, and all of the documents stored in that file, were destroyed.

Fortunately, the CRTC was not in a position to destroy all copies of those documents and several are currently available for review on www.onemedialaw.com, including an unpublished decision by the CRTC in which it ruled itself and cable television companies innocent of unlawful activities.

I am writing to formally request an explanation as to why exactly CRTC file 1000-121 was destroyed on March 27th, 2006.

In addition, I am requesting that you identify who at the CRTC made the decision to destroy CRTC file 1000-121 at that particular time.

As background, I've requested the same information from the two previous CRTC chairs but they both opted not to provide this specific information to me.

You may be aware that I was involved in a precedent-setting legal case years ago that is related to a company subsidy scheme and CRTC file 1000-121. However, that was a civil matter (as attached).

Presently, I am far more interested in the methods employed by individuals at the CRTC to obstruct proper scrutiny into that company subsidy scheme in the context of how the Supreme Court of Canada determined what constitutes the offence of breach of trust in *R v. Boulanger* (as attached).

I look forward to your reply.
